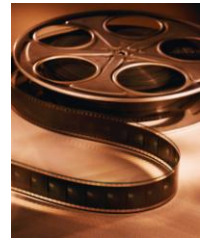

## FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

Films with sound had just begun to be made when Charlie Chaplin had already begun production of a silent film named *City Lights*. It thereby became one of the last of the silent films to come out of Hollywood. Chaplin wrote, directed, and starred in this movie, which on most lists of great films, ranks near the top. Chaplin plays his recurring role as the little tramp, a vagabond with “nowhere to lay his head.” This outcaste ironically plays a redemptive role in other characters’ lives. He meets a beautiful young woman who is blind who sells flowers on the street. Soon thereafter he is able to keep an intoxicated, suicidal rich man from drowning himself. He is befriended by the rich man whenever he is drinking and rejected by him when he is sober. He convinces the wealthy man (while he is drunk) to give him money so the visually-impaired woman can have an operation to restore her sight. Later, the tramp is accused of having stolen the wealthy man’s money. He is apprehended and imprisoned.



After he has served his sentence, the little tramp comes out of prison shabbier and lonelier than ever. The young woman, who has had her sight restored had imagined her benefactor to be a handsome man of means. She does not recognize the poor disheveled man who was instrumental in restoring her sight. Only in the final scene does she have occasion to touch his hand. By this touch, she realizes who he is, and says, “You?” He asks, “You can see now?” The young woman, now sobbing, replies, “Yes, I can see now.”

There is seeing and then there is recognition. As this new year begins, I hope and pray that we can recognize and acknowledge the One whose love, dedication, and sacrifice has opened the way for our ability to see physically and spiritually.

We thank Janice also for her volunteer time as coordinator and for trying out a new system of signing up on a chart to be an usher. This has helped to cut down on phone calls but still leaves a need to call people to fill in the gaps on the chart.



Another thank you goes out to all of you who have generously served as ushers over the many past years. Ushers do many tasks in preparation for a worship service each Sunday (just check the full page list found in the Narthex to see how varied and many the tasks are). We appreciate how each person who has served has given time before, during, and after the worship services. Without you, we would not have as smooth running a service as we do on Sundays.

But now we need more people to sign up to be ushers. It takes four people each Sunday to do this work. It is not strenuous but it does require some standing. You can sign up for a full month (most desirable) or for just one Sunday but please volunteer if at all possible. We especially need volunteers to usher in January and February. If you will be at church, it only takes a little extra time before and after the service. Watch for the sign up chart in the Narthex or on the bulletin board outside the office or down in the Social Hall. We will try to make it convenient for you to sign up.

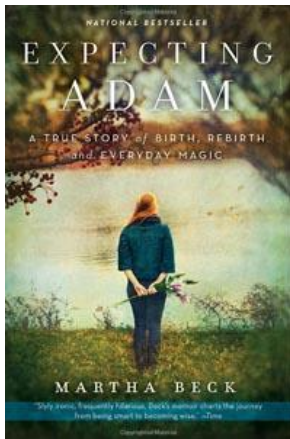

## JOY CIRCLE—WOMEN'S BOOK CLUB PLANS

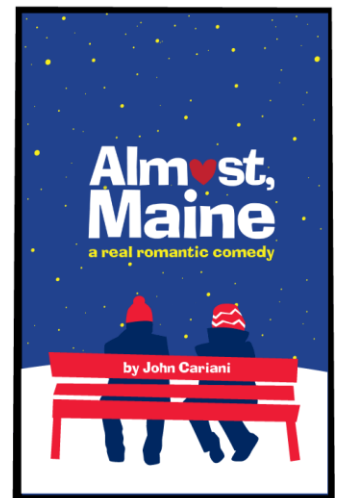


We will meet on **Tuesday, January 14th at 7:30PM in the Common Room** for our third Book Club event. The book of the evening is, **“Expecting Adam”** by Martha Beck. From the web, “John and Martha Beck had two Harvard degrees apiece when they conceived their second child. Further graduate studies, budding careers, and a growing family meant major stress- not that they'd have admitted it to anyone (or themselves). As the pregnancy progressed, Martha battled constant nausea and dehydration. And when she learned her unborn son had Down syndrome, she battled nearly everyone over her decision to continue the pregnancy. She still cannot explain many of the things that happened to her while she was expecting Adam, but by the time he was born, Martha, as she puts it, "had to unlearn virtually everything Harvard taught [her] about what is precious and what is garbage."

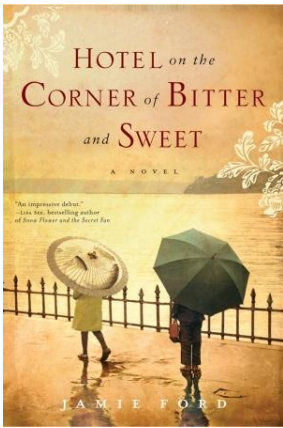
On Friday, January 31st, we were scheduled to have a book club gathering. However, we have decided to cancel that meeting and gather instead on **Saturday, Feb 8th to attend the play, “Almost, Maine” at Einstein High School.** The show will start at **7:00PM** and we'll meet afterward at Sue Burns' home, which is conveniently located just a few blocks from Einstein, for refreshments and Fellowship.

From the play's website, “... Welcome to Almost, Maine, a town that's so far north, it's almost not in the United States—it's almost in Canada. And it almost doesn't exist. Because its residents never got around to getting organized. So it's just... Almost. One cold, clear Friday night in the middle of winter, while the northern lights hover in the sky above, Almost's residents find themselves falling in and out of love in the strangest ways. Knees are bruised. Hearts are broken. Love is lost, found, and confounded. And life for the people of Almost, Maine will never be the same...”

This is a charming play that features both Jordan Hill and Kyle Smeallie. Proceeds will be used to help fund the A.E.H.S. theater program's trip to perform at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival next August. They both attend an otherwise white prep school as "scholarship students" in Seattle. Henry's father is adamantly anti-Japanese, as is the increasingly hostile general population of Seattle following the Attack on Pearl Harbor. In spite of this, Henry and Keiko begin an intense friendship until Keiko is taken to an internment camp with her family...” Please plan to join us and invite others who may be interested. ## THAI WOMEN’S HANDICRAFT PROJECT

Since 2009, PW of Warner has supported women and children in northern Thailand through the sales of articles made by The Women’s Sewing Cooperative of Huaikrai. In October, June Eakin held a sale at St. Matthews Presbyterian and in November at a local school holiday bazaar. **These events sold just over \$1,000 (the minimum amount we send as a check to Thailand).** Thank you for your support of this project.



We have sold most of the inventory and plan to ship the remainder to another church to find a market for these goods. Do you know someone who might want to support this mission to reduce human trafficking through dignified work for women?

Monique Ellison and Barbara DeLorenzo, both from St. Christopher's Church (Episcopal) in Linthicum, Maryland. 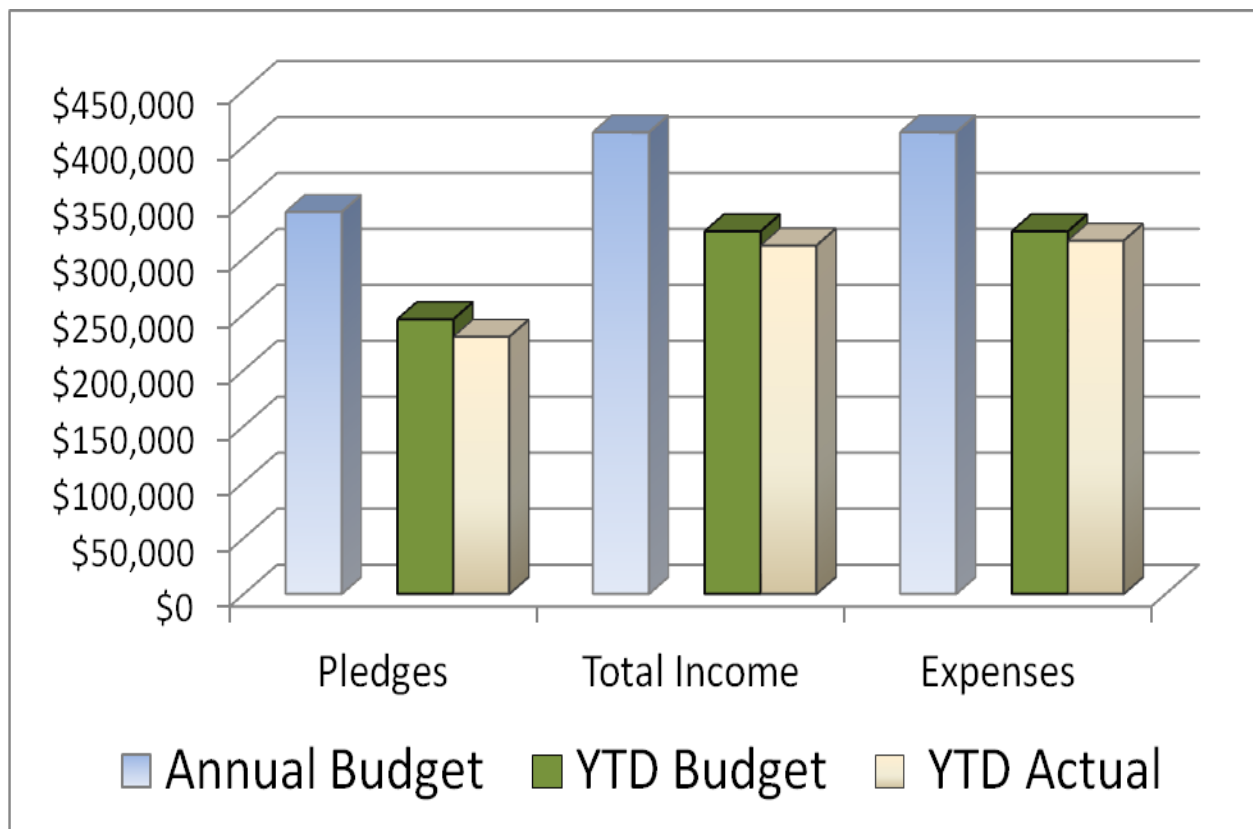
