FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

Holy Week is a week like any other week with the same days as any other week. I guess it is a bit different for those involved with the public school system – it will be spring break week for them. But this week can be different for all of us, as we seek to take a break from how we normally view things in order to reflect on the events of a week over 2000 years ago that shapes our lives today.

It, of course, begins with Palm Sunday on April 13th. The last several years, we have had a combined palm and passion (crucifixion) focus for this day in our worship service, but this year, we will explore how Jesus' entrance into the holy city potentially makes a difference in how we perceive all comings and goings. We'll do so with palm branches and singing. And then we will continue our celebration with our Palm Sunday brunch after the service – you read that right – it will be a Palm Sunday brunch instead of an Easter breakfast this year.

On Maundy Thursday, April 17th, we'll have one evening service. In recent years, we've had a luncheon service at noon in the social hall to enable those who don't get out at night to come. This year, we'll need to make sure such folks are offered a ride. There will be a meal offered at 6 p.m. (see elsewhere in this Memo for details) and the 7:30 service will focus on not only the last supper and the institution of the sacrament of communion, it will follow the events of Jesus' arrest, trial, denial, and crucifixion as the sanctuary is darkened as Jesus moves toward his death. Special music will accompany us through this journey. I hope you will make every effort to attend this Maundy Thursday / Tenebrae (which means 'darkness') service.

On Good Friday, April 18th, there will still be a gathering at noon, this time in the room formerly known as the parlor, to reflect on our Lord's last words from the cross.

On Easter Sunday, April 20th, for those who welcome the opportunity for an outdoor worship experience, there will be a service at the pavilion behind Temple Emanuel at 8 a.m. (note the different time from previous years). There will, of course, also be a grand resurrection celebration at our 11 a.m. service in the sanctuary, with the special flowers reminding us of the beauty and the life that is a result of that first Easter morning.

I think our Holy Week experience can go well beyond this being just another week.

GETTING ACQUAINTED WITH OUR NEW HYMNS

You may have noticed that, sometimes during our Sunday services, the bulletin makes note that the first stanza will be sung by the choir, and the following stanzas will be sung by everyone. That is a clue that this is a new hymn in our hymnals. Our musicians use two tools to help us learn this new music. First, our organist plays the piece all the way through. Then the choir sings the first stanza. And then it is our turn as a congregation. We hope this will help all of us to learn, and to love these new hymns.

Another tool to help us become attached to the hymns in the new hymnal is the description (in fine print) at the bottom of the page. This gives some background on the words in the hymn. Before the service starts, you may want to look up the hymns and read this background. It is very interesting, but is difficult to read while trying to sing (I've tried).

We also want to point out that you will see two sets of page numbers in the bulletin after the scripture readings. There are two different printings of the pew Bibles, which means that you will find the readings on one page or the other depending on which printing is in your hand. Before the service starts on Sunday, you may want to look up the scriptures and mark them for easy reference. Be assured that the words are the same in both versions; just the page numbering is different.

GARDEN NEWS—RENEWAL IN SPRINGTIME

This year, we welcome our neighboring congregation at Temple Emanuel, whose members are joining Warner on this garden project. Together, we'll continue the tradition of growing produce for the Shepherd's Table community hunger relief program in Silver Spring. The garden began



as an Eagle Scout project by Casey McGrath. Later, Karen Buitano (a Girl Scout as the time), led the effort. Recently, Susan Bresee and June Eakin have taken the lead in maintaining the Shepherd's Garden. Tuesday, April 22, is "Earth Day". As you may know, Warner is a certified "Earth Care Congregation" in our nationwide denomination. This annual certification works to keep us aware of good environmental stewardship practices—at church, at home, or wherever we go. BUILDING & GROUNDS

WARNER'S CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS CAMPAIGN CONTINUES

Have you noticed? On the main floor of our building, work continues on the new lavatory for handicapped access, and it should be completed soon. On the outside, near the corner of Connecticut Avenue and Washington Street, work on the new elevator tower is also progressing well. We look forward to completion of these improvements soon.

SESSION & NCP MEETINGS

At its March 17th meeting, the Warner Session:

- 1. Adopted a plan to move forward toward listing the "grassy lot" on Prospect Street for sale.
- 2. Heard a report on construction project progress. We have now taken our first drawdown of funds from our loan in order to pay our construction bills.
- 3. Announced that the harpsichord has been repaired and is now in the chancel.
- 4. Renamed the parlor; a name that will be publicly announced when the room is dedicated on a to-be-determined date.
- 5. Started putting together a team to recommend a design for our narthex that would be appealing to guests.

The National Capital Presbytery met on March 18, 2014 at National Presbyterian Church. During the meeting, NCP:

- 1. Approved the recommendations of the Wilson Lane Commission for the disposition of some church property.
- 2. Waived the designation of the DC Equipping Ministry Resurrection Fund in order to give Northminster Presbyterian Church a loan of \$255,000 to replace their heating and air conditioning system.
- 3. Heard a report on the process adopted by the Leadership Council for use should a church wish to disaffiliate from the PC (USA).
- 4. Approved an overture on maternal and child nutrition, as well as an overture on gun violence prevention, which will be forwarded to the 221st General Assembly for consideration.
- 5. Denied a request to concur with an overture on Presbyterian Witness for Palestinian Human Rights and for Ending the Occupation of Palestine because of its provocative language.



OUR WARNER HISTORY – A TREASURE UNCOVERED

During the construction project in the pastor's office, a cabinet in the main office needed to be moved. It was filled with boxes of paper. So, everything was carefully removed, and June Eakin began sorting through it all, wanting to see if any of it could be thrown away. It turned out to be a treasure trove of records from the early 1900's through the early 1990's; Warner Memos (including the very first newsletter from 1953), Sunday Bulletins (from 1959-1975 that have been missing from the collection in the library), meeting agendas, deposit ledgers, a photo or two, annual reports, a few birth certificates, and used books of church transfer certificates, with just the filledout stubs remaining, were all re-discovered in this process. Additionally, we found what we believe to be Rev. Wendell Tredick's sermons—the whole collection of more than 400 sermons from the 19 years that he was Pastor—numbered and written in very neat cursive on medium-sized copperplate paper.

Its Life and Work

We will put these items safely in various places to make room for other things in the office, and over the coming months, we will take a closer look at them and decide how and where to officially keep them for others to peruse, or to store. It is my hope that the bulletins will someday be bound together and added to the collection in the library, and that other documents may be scanned and saved on CDs so that we may enjoy reading them, and have them safely kept for future generations and historians. There is also the option of sending items to the Presbyterian Historical Society.

The process of binding paper is expensive, so we ask that if you are interested in donating money toward this effort, please contact the church office. We will just keep them safely stored until funds become available.

Our monthly Warner Memo articles can use a splash of color. If you often take pictures at Warner events, or if you would like to start doing so at whatever gatherings you attend, please submit them for our use. We would like to include a name, as well, so be sure to let us know who took the photo. Additionally, if you are an illustrator or painter, we would very much enjoy including a drawing or painting that corresponds with the subject of the pastor's message, upcoming bible verses, or another subject having to do with life at Warner. Please consider sharing your talents in this way. We look forward to your submittals. In the background are April MEMO covers from the 1960s. SUMMER CAMP FOR GALS!


June 6-9th at Massanetta Springs, Harrisonburg, VA
