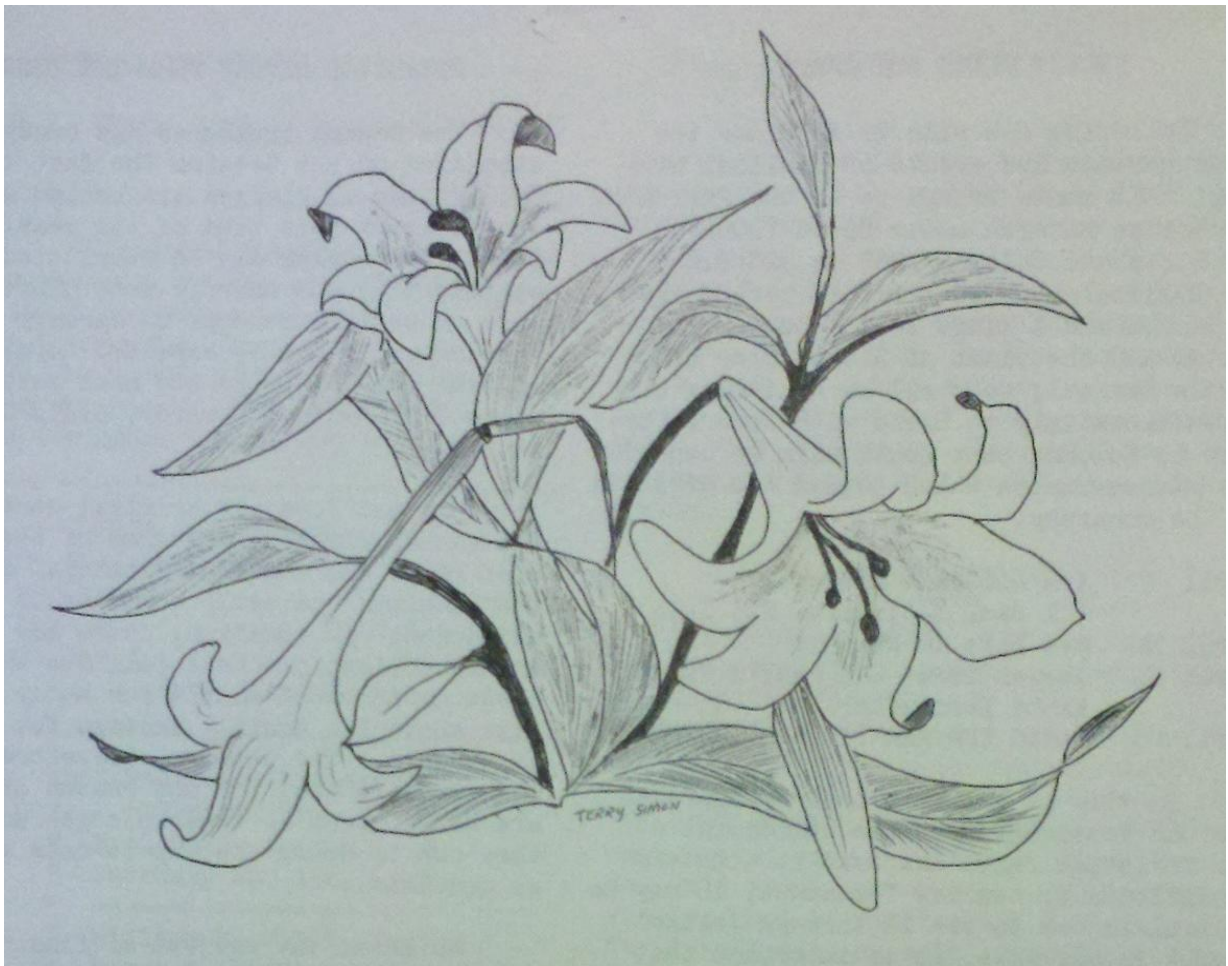

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

The General Assembly is the highest governing body of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Last summer it voted with 71% approval for a change in the definition of marriage in our Book of Order, which is part of our Presbyterian constitution. That change has now been ratified by a majority of presbyteries across the country (about 70% have voted in favor so far), including National Capital Presbytery which voted 217-55-6 in favor of the change. The new wording will now read as follows: “Marriage is a gift God has given to all humankind for the well-being of the entire human family. Marriage involves a unique commitment between two people, traditionally a man and a woman, to love and support each other for the rest of their lives. The sacrificial love that unites the couple sustains them as faithful and responsible members of the church and the wider community.”

Some would say that the understanding of marriage by people of faith should never change, but there are examples in scripture of polygamy, and we no longer accept that as an appropriate practice. At one time it was commonly accepted in the church that people of different races should not get married or that someone who was divorced should never remarry. Once women were common expected to make a vow that they would “obey” their husband and, of course, the man was never asked to make the same promise. The understanding of marriage has changed in ways that I think could make it a stronger and broader institution if those who enter into it do so with loving commitment, respect, and faithfulness. The church will do what it can to encourage such things.

There has been additional language added to the Book of Order that makes it clear that no minister is required to officiate a wedding of which he or she disapproves. The Session still has power to approve or disapprove of a wedding to be held on church property.

In my understanding, the Bible does not contemplate the possibility of same-gender marriage; but many who stand under the authority of scripture today, in the spirit of the ever-widening understanding of who is included in the love and grace of God, have concluded that biblical moral logic values committed, mutual, loving partnerships – regardless of the gender of the partners. I understand that it may be difficult to get used to some of these changes, but I believe our denomination is guiding us toward being faithful witnesses to the love and justice of Jesus Christ, whom we seek to follow in our world today.

INHABITING EDEN

"By the Holy Spirit, I am made one with the Lord Jesus Christ. I am baptized into Christ's body, the church. As a member of this community, I trust in God's Word, share in the Lord's Supper, and turn to God in prayer. As I grow in grace and knowledge, I am led to do the good works that God intends for my life." -The Study Catechism



The words from the Study Catechism provide a context for the process of becoming a confirmed member of the church family. Confirmation classes are designed to invite, encourage, and help prepare young people to serve as faithful disciples and active church members. The process began with a weekend retreat at Bishop Claggett Retreat Center that focused on Reformed tradition and how it shapes our journeys of faith. Along with youth from area Presbyterian churches, four youth from Warner Church, Charlotte Cook, Shane Gillette, Calvin McGlade, and Simon Winter participated. Janet Tennent and Jan Moody served as chaperones.

The confirmation classes continue in the spring with a series of Sunday afternoon, one and a half hour sessions, 12:30 to 2:00, led by Rev. Hill and Jan Moody. Some of the topics covered in the sessions include: Bible study, overview of tenets of Reformed faith,

exploration of what it means to be part of a covenant community, and attendance at worship services of a variety of faith communities that will include visits to Jewish and Catholic congregations.

During Lent, some of the parents of the confirmands participated in a series of Wednesday evening study sessions that were designed to facilitate discussion among parents about ways, with God's help, that we can equip our children to “grow in grace and knowledge”. The book *Almost Christian*, by Kenda Creasy Dean and the Parent's Guide, *Raising Teens in an Almost Christian World* guided our discussions.

On **June 7**, the Confirmation Class will meet with the Warner Church Session for breakfast and to share their statements of faith. During the 11:00 worship service that day the new members from the class will be welcomed by the congregation.

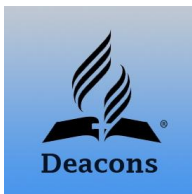

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP TEAM

CONSERVATION TIP OF THE MONTH



As a follow-up to the ideas presented at the Fellowship Hour on March 15, the Environmental Stewardship Team offers this information from *Cool Cuisine: Taking the Bite Out of Global Warming*, by Laura Stec with Eugene Cordero, Ph.D. (© 2008):

“In determining the carbon footprint of your next meal, consider these questions:

- How far do I travel to buy food and how do I get there?
- How much food am I buying—will I eat it all?
- What kind of food am I buying—is it plant based or animal based?
- Geographically, where is my food coming from?
- Is my food organic?
- How processed is my food?
- What kind of packaging is used for my food?
- Do I buy too many processed foods that need to be frozen or refrigerated?
- How am I disposing of the food and packaging waste?

“A cool cuisine would reduce your overall carbon footprint by using fewer animal products, fewer processed foods, less bottled water, and less food and packaging waste and using more fresh, organic, seasonal, and locally grown whole foods such as vegetables, fruits, and whole grains.”

For those who are interested in learning more about “Cool Cuisine,” the book is available in the church library, on loan from Mark & June Eakin.

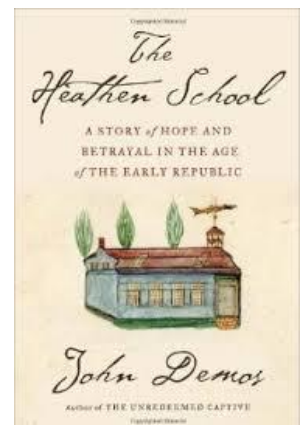
