## FROM THE PASTOR

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Dear members and friends,

One of the most famous paintings in the world is the *Last Supper* by Leonardo da Vinci. He painted it late in the 15th century in a convent in Milan, Italy. There is a story that as he was about to finish the painting, da Vinci invited his students to come in and take a look at it and critique it. He unveiled it and the students praised the intricate work, beauty and delicacy of – the tablecloth. The legend is that Leonardo took a brush with paint and with one sweeping gesture painted over the tablecloth. “Look at the Master’s face!” he said. “Look at the Master’s face!”

In the middle of the 19th century, author Mary Shelley described her impression of the painting in her travel narrative. She wrote: “First we visited the fading inimitable fresco of Leonardo da Vinci. How vain are copies! Not in one, nor in any print, did I ever see the slightest approach to the expression in our Savior’s face, such as it is in the original. Majesty and love- there are the words that would describe it – joined to an absence of all guile that expresses the divine nature more visibly than I ever saw it in any other picture.”

The significance of the birth of Jesus is that he is the One through whom we can see the very face of God. There are many things, like having the ‘right’ tablecloth, that can distract us from the truest essence of the importance of his coming. Look for the majesty and love that is revealed in the face of Jesus and don’t let even the intricacy, beauty, and delicacy of other Christmastime events divert your gaze.

InterFaith Works maintains an InterFaith Clothing Center for the working-poor, stocked with clean and serviceable donated clothing available to them without cost, thereby helping them to stretch their earnings to cover more of the necessities, and in addition, InterFaith Works has a "Birthday Closet" at the center from which a child having a birthday can receive a birthday gift. The Director of Family Services says, "I cannot tell you how much the children we serve appreciate being able to get a special new toy on their birthday."

If you would like to help stock the Birthday Closet, please bring a new, unwrapped present that you think would please either a young boy or girl, and place it beneath our Angel Tree, which you will find located on the edge of the stage in the Warner social hall. Just as the wise men brought gifts to the baby Jesus in celebration of his Birth Day, we can help celebrate the birthdays of dear children throughout the year.

## ***Christmas Joy Offering***

The annual Presbyterian Christmas Joy Offering is traditionally received during the Advent Season. At Warner, we will begin to receive the Joy Gift on Sunday December 4th and continue through Christmas. The Joy Offering provides assistance in two areas: grants to current and retired church workers in their time of need and to develop our future leaders at Presbyterian-related racial ethnic schools and colleges.

- The Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions provides critical financial assistance to eligible workers in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and their families, and to qualifying retired church workers and their families. In 2015, gifts to the Joy Offering helped make possible \$3.8 million in grants to more than 600 households in need.
- The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has an institutional relationship agreement with four historically Presbyterian Racial Ethnic colleges and universities and one college preparatory school, which educate women and men for professions of their choice. This work helps overcome hurdles that the students may face due to their racial or ethnic heritage.

## COMMUNITY – MISSION

### ***Where Does Our Mission Money Go?***

For many years, Warner's Commission to the Community has been supporting Peter Graeff's work in Haiti. Last month we made one of our quarterly \$500 payments toward this work. Peter grew up as a member of Warner and remained a member until he joined the Peace Corps. Trained as an agronomist, Peter found his calling helping people in developing countries improve their lives through more effective and sustainable agricultural practices. He has been working in Haiti for more than 30 years and primarily serves to help people on the small island of La Gonave just west of Haiti's capital, Port-Au-Prince.

While he focuses on agronomy, much of Peter's work has been to help his neighbors in La Gonave improve their ability to have successful careers and live productively and self-sufficiently. We have come to know many of these neighbors through the years and it has been a pleasure to help them succeed. Warner has been pleased to support Peter's work throughout his time in Haiti.

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The Warner Memorial Commission to the Community would like to thank the Warner congregation for their contributions to the ***Peace and Global Witness Offering*** during the month of October. The total amount of donations collected was \$1,644. Seventy-five percent of that amount will go to the national and international peacemaking efforts of the denomination. The other 25 percent will be used by organizations selected by Warner's Commission to the Community. In recent years, we have divided that portion among three organizations:

**The Interfaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington (IFC)** fosters dialogue among persons and peoples with differing beliefs in the DC area. The IFC holds workshops and seminars ... and each year around Thanksgiving the IFC holds a concert to celebrate the diverse cultures that exist in our nearby community.

## **MISSION – continuing article - Peace & Global Witness Offering**

**The Family Tree**, an organization headquartered in Baltimore but serving all of Maryland, has a “Stress Line” which anyone in a parenting crisis can call at any hour of the day or night to talk with someone who will offer guidance through a difficult time. The Family Tree also gives classes in parenting that teach how to discipline effectively without resorting to physical or verbal abuse.

**The Jerusalem International YMCA (JIY)** over the years has become increasingly inclusive. It offers programs open to Christian, Jewish, and Muslim children, youth, and adults where they can come together to play and learn.

Your donation will deepen Warner’s connections to local, national, and international peacemaking efforts in some of the most difficult places of conflict in the world. It will provide opportunities to help reduce global conflict, racism, militarization, gun violence, bullying, and church conflict, and provide resources that train people like us to be part of proclaiming Christ’s peace to all God’s children. Thank you and the peace of Christ be with you.

# DEACONS

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At our monthly meeting on Monday, November 28, the Warner board of deacons reviewed the project of supplying Saturday dinners in November for Rainbow Place women's shelter in Rockville, which the deacons coordinate. We look forward to renewing this effort in February 2017.

We organized the plan for Christmas gift baskets, which we'll prepare on December 19, and deliver that week to Warner's "shut-ins." The deacons will also take poinsettia plants to those homebound folks over Christmas.

We discussed the ongoing monthly need for funds to provide Giant food grocery gift cards for indigent people who come seeking help at Warner Church. From the deacons' fund, we contribute as we are able. We also worked on how best to provide transportation and/or visitation for several people in our congregation. Additionally, the deacons help with Warner's awareness of the ongoing needs of Mid-county United Ministries (MUM).

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## **GIVING EMPOWERS LOVE - Stewardship Report**

The Stewardship Work Team set an aggressive goal of a 10% increase in pledge amounts for 2017 compared with 2016. The congregation has responded very generously to that challenge as we are almost 90% toward our goal, while we are still waiting on those who have yet to pledge to get their pledge cards in. Some 80% of the pledges show an increase over last year's pledge. Over half of the pledges show at least a 10% increase! The Stewardship Team is very thankful for the generous response so far and urges those who have not gotten their pledge cards in to the office yet to please do so. Each pledge helps the Session know what we can budget for the coming year, and we definitely want to see how our campaign theme can be lived out as our Giving Empowers Love!

# BUILDING & GROUNDS

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## ***What's new around our building?***

The new landscaping at the LCYC entrance is a place to pause with children and enjoy a bit of our natural world. It was lovingly designed and installed in memory of Tucker and Alana Schruben; the walkway incorporates a train track theme for his love of Thomas the Tank Engine. In the spring, we look forward to a bench – place to sit to tie a shoe or have a quiet talk. This garden is being funded through memorial donations.

Why do the plants look dead? Our new conservation landscaping not only enhances handling of water runoff, it also provides cover and food for wildlife. Seed-heads and foliage will not be trimmed until springtime. The yew bushes along Calvert were trimmed to accommodate the concrete work; we hope for renewed growth in the spring.

## Projects recently accomplished

- handrails repaired and installed on new concrete steps. Next step is painting, if you can help contact Ken Kramer.
  - Apron and driveway now allow access to our grassy parking lot on Prospect St. Rain is needed to grow grass seed, drive there cautiously
  - Gas leaks and boiler repairs keep the system functioning properly.
- At the top of the list of building priorities designated by the Warner Session was the need for new sanctuary doors and framing to replace what is barely functional and secure. We express deep appreciation to Mark and June Eakin for covering the costs that will beautify the entrance to our sanctuary. The gift is being given in memory of Mark's mother, Tillie. A committee is considering choices and installation is expected by early spring.

# ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

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In the wake of recent campaign promises and the ratified U.N. COP 21 agreement, local actions are more important than ever in preserving our world for the future. But what can we do? In the book of Micah (6:8) we find instruction in “what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?” In the PC (USA) document “Power to Change” we are urged, “Presbyterians can set an important example of stewardship by not only minimizing our energy consumption, but also by pursuing a carbon neutral lifestyle.” In the January 2016 MEMO we offered the following suggestions from our Adult Faith Formation classes:

- Have an energy audit conducted on your home.
- Consider rooftop solar panels or purchasing renewable energy as your electric source.
- Use alternatives to toxic chemicals.
- Eat less meat, especially beef.
- Put in conservation landscaping and native plants.
- If you have financial investments, you may use faith-based investing and seek out those that are socially responsible, either in mutual funds or equities.
