FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

Long-term psychological studies are rare, but there has been one that has gone on over 75 years. It is currently led by a Harvard psychiatrist named Robert Waldinger, who has described what has been learned through the research on a Ted Talk. You can Google it. The study has sought to determine what leads to happier and healthier lives and one finding is quite clear: those satisfied in their relationships were happier and healthier. In his Ted Talk, Waldinger says, “People who are more isolated than they want to be from others find that they are less happy, their health declines earlier in midlife, their brain functioning declines sooner and they live shorter lives than people who are not lonely. And good close relationships seem to buffer us from some of the slings and arrows of getting old.” Waldinger wants people to realize that the commercial projection of a good life – wealth, fame, career success – won’t bring them health or happiness. It’s the work they put into maintaining connections with other human beings that will.

As we enter the beginning of a new year, it is a time to assess what is of value in our lives and what holds less value. Here is a good indication that it makes sense to spend time building up and nurturing good relationships. There’s not much better way to do this than by seeking to love our neighbors (Jesus did not define neighbor by proximity or by similarities) as ourselves. I am thankful for the many positive relationships in and through Warner Church that enrich and benefit (in more ways than one) us all. There are blessings all around us as we enter 2017. That doesn’t mean there aren’t also many challenges, but I am thankful for those who journey in faith together, loving each other and learning from each other. It is a rich way to live.

COMMUNITY -- MISSION

YOUR “MISSION COMMISSION” IN ACTION:

By December the tally from the October Peace and Global Witness offering had reached a final total of \$1644. After sending the denomination their portion, we used the rest, as in previous years, for several organizations that we have chosen to support. One of these charities is the Jerusalem International YMCA (JIY), an organization located in the heart of Jerusalem, with a mission that emphasizes promotion of tolerance.



To this end JIY has many activities that bring Jews, Muslims, and Christians living in Israel to work or play side by side. It starts with a Peace Preschool that welcomes children from all faiths (see picture). There are summer camps for grade-school kids. There is a club for teenagers to produce TV presentations, and theatre groups for teenagers who are interested in acting or dancing, and choirs that sing in multiple languages. All these have the effect of allowing young people to do things together with others from different communities.

During the Christmas season there were special activities: The preschool taught the children about the traditions of Hannukkah, Id el Adha, and Christmas. Also, JIY held its annual holiday party, in which about 600 children, including orphans and some with disabilities, were treated to musical entertainment and gifts. Jewish and Christian Arab choirs performed together in interfaith performances. And on Christmas Eve a special concert featured classical holiday music and carol sing-alongs. We are pleased that a portion of our offering can support an organization that so clearly exemplifies peacemaking.

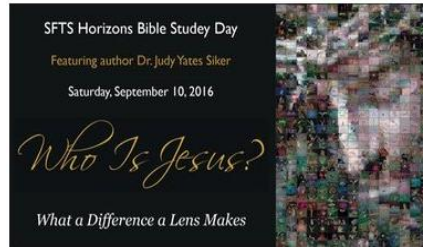
THIRD ANNUAL GIFT FAIR – ANOTHER SUCCESS... THANKS TO ALL

2017 BIBLE STUDY: WHO IS JESUS? WHAT A DIFFERENCE A LENS MAKES...



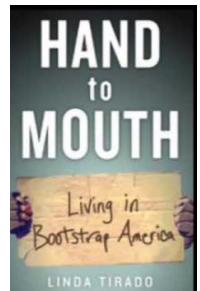

JANUARY 2017 PW BOOK CLUB

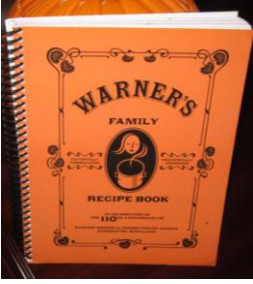


Please plan to join us on Friday, *January 27* for our fourth discussion of the 2016-2017 season. Our book this month is, “*Hand to Mouth*” by Linda
