FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

Thanks to the 80 of you who took the C.A.T. (Congregation Assessment Tool) survey! In comparison to our average worship attendance, we were told that is a very high response rate. You gave a lot of information that the Session will mull over in the coming months. The Session has had its initial meeting with interpreters of the information gleaned from the C.A.T. There are additional reports about what you said, which we will review and use in our strategic planning going forward.

Here are the top four goals you chose as we look to the future:

- Make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth to our church.
- Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.
- Work to renew and revitalize the community around the church by building coalitions with partners that share this vision and commitment.
- Develop the spiritual generosity of the people to financially support the ministry of the church.

Those first two goals are tops for 80% of the congregations that have taken the C.A.T. over the last 18 months, so we are not alone there. But clearly there is work to be done. The third goal was significantly stronger for our congregation than it is for most congregations, so that is of interest.

Other goals that were stronger for our congregation than for most:

- Adapt the opportunities provided by the church making them more accessible given the pace and schedule of my life.
- Improve the physical facilities of the church to enhance our ministries.

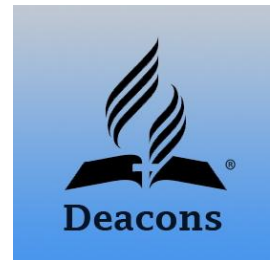
Our demographics are such that if we are not successful on these goals, then we will be a much smaller congregation in ten to twenty years. So it is good that we rated fairly high in satisfaction and in energy. Those measures put a label on our congregation as one that could be able to go through a needed transformation, which is good! There is significant work to be done and I am thankful that so many are invested in the well-being of our congregation, that with God's help, we will be able to work in ways that will strengthen our overall ministry and lead to greater levels of energy and satisfaction for the congregation.

The Session will work with this information in coming months and you will hear more from them about initiatives to respond to your important input. Those who took the survey helped those initiatives to be informed ones, for which we can be very thankful. I am excited to see what God will be doing within and through Warner Memorial in months to come!

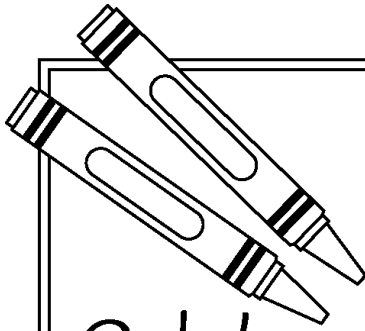

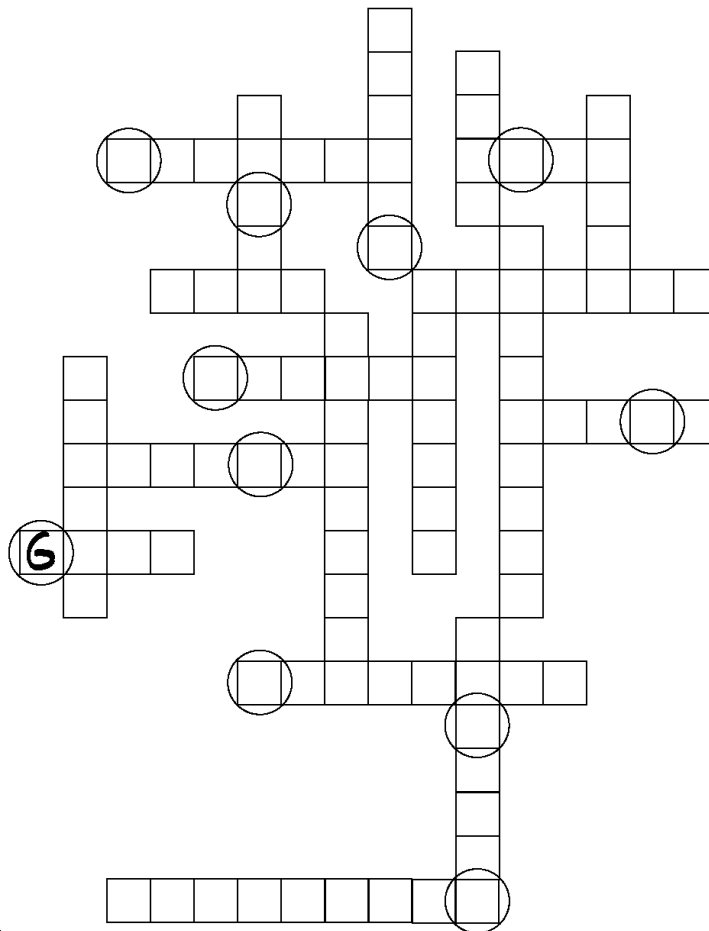

YOUR “MISSION COMMISSION” IN ACTION

As the school year ends, our Commission thinks especially of ways to help next year’s local school kids who have serious financial needs. This determines our giving in June.

One gift we make each year is for the Interfaith Works School Supplies Drive. Each year this program provides new backpacks and school supplies to more than 2,500 students who are preparing for the new school year. The cost of school supplies can be just too much for a family already struggling to pay for rent, food, utilities and clothing. The contents of the backpacks include packages of lined filler paper, tab dividers, 2-pocket folders, and pencil pouches. And of course, a new backpack will help the child feel less out of place in school. The \$400 gift that Warner made in June will help some kids in Montgomery County get off to a good start.

Also, a few years ago the Commission members felt a concern for school kids who would go hungry when the school lunch program shuts down for the summer. We searched for a group that is stepping into the gap during the summer vacation time, when no school lunches are served. We found that the Capital Area Food Bank runs a Kids Café both after school and throughout the summer, where children can receive free, healthy meals and snacks. Therefore, we now dedicate the discretionary portion of our Two Cents a Meal offerings for June and July to the Capital Area Food Bank to support the Kids Café program.

(The food that we harvest in our Shepherd's Garden always goes to the Shepherd's Table food program in Silver Spring.) A few dollars of seeds results in many pounds of produce!

Water is vital to sustaining life. Many places on earth suffer from a lack of a good, clean water supply. Sometimes, an abundance of rain water in a short period can cause devastation, as we saw recently in the disastrous floods in West Virginia.

People in all communities need to practice conservation and preservation of water. We can observe these good practices at home and at work. We can be careful about using chemicals, such as household cleansers and lawn treatments. We can support local and state-wide groups that work to clean-up our waterways – streams, lakes and ponds, and the greater Chesapeake Bay. And, of course, we can join with others to plant trees and shrubs that enhance the soil and prevent water runoff and erosion.

WHO IS JESUS ? WHAT A DIFFERENCE A LENS MAKES...

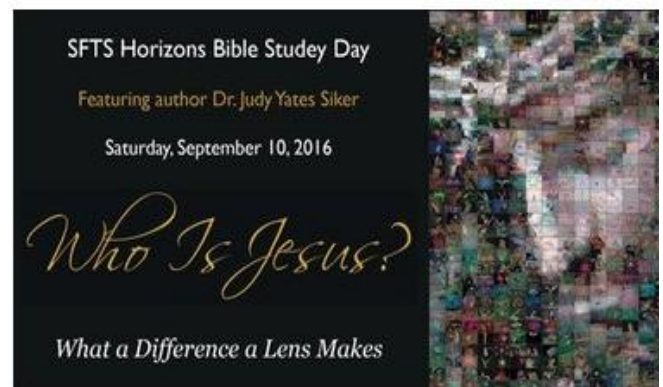
Joy Circle will tackle this question over two years, 2016-2018 with the Horizons Bible Study (2016-17) and its companion DVD.
