## EARLY WORSHIP SERVICE IN JULY AND AUGUST

## FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

How ironic! Dyllan Roof, the confessed murderer of nine African Americans who were at a Bible study at a Charleston church, said he wanted to start a race war. And yet his actions and the pictures of him surrounded by a Confederate battle flag have been the impetus needed to lead to a watershed moment undermining the political strength of that flag. The flag, which was used by the Army of Northern Virginia during the Civil War, has a complicated history. There are some well-meaning people who view that flag as emblematic of honor and service to the concept of state rights. But there are others who are not well-meaning at all who have used that symbol in intimidating ways to push for segregation and the ideas of white supremacy. It was during the push for desegregation in the 1950's and 60's that this battle flag was brought back out and incorporated in state flags throughout much of the South as a symbol against fair treatment of all people. Many of us who grew up in the South thought that symbol would never lose its power. But the ugliness associated with it has quite suddenly become difficult to defend.

That doesn't mean that our country has finished its work on issues related to race and violence – we are far from that goal. But symbols are important and I am thankful to have that Confederate flag relegated more to the past than as a part of the present. I certainly wish the church had a symbol that proclaims God's love for every human being, that decries the use of violence, that reminds us of the possibilities of redemptive change. Oh, I guess we do have such a symbol – it is called the cross. By our words and actions, those of us who seek to follow the One who died on that cross can also become symbols of what that cross can mean. We won't get the same amount of media coverage as one person who picks up a gun, but God can use all kinds of ways to bring about needed change, which gives us hope that God's goodness might be reflected even in us.

### POPE SPEAKS OUT ON CARING FOR GOD’S CREATION

Pope Francis released his papal encyclical on the environment. It includes messages consistent with the moral mandate to care for God's creation and the understanding that poverty, hunger and environmental degradation are interlocking issues that invoke our faithful action. He speaks clearly on the ethical responsibility to act in the face of climate change. Read the [summary](#) or [full text](#).

Presbyterians General Assemblies have passed many environmental resolutions and statements on caring for God's creation, acting on everything from water and land use to energy and climate change. Congregations, church institutions, and individual Presbyterians are committed to earth care as part of daily discipleship and embrace any opportunity to learn and to grow in faith.

We are grateful for Pope Francis' leadership and wisdom and the encyclical, knowing it is a wonderful opportunity for everyone in the faith community to speak pastorally, and prophetically, on the moral basis for environmental and climate justice. ### GARDENING TO “MAKE A DIFFERENCE”

Doug Tallamy, in his book *Bringing Nature Home*, wrote:

“Now, for the first time in its history, gardening has taken on a role that transcends the needs of the gardener. Like it or not, gardeners have become important players in the management of our nation’s wildlife. It is now within the power of individual gardeners to do something that we all dream of doing: to ‘make a difference.’ In this case, the ‘difference’ will be to the future of biodiversity, to the native plants and animals of North America and the ecosystems that sustain them.”

Here, to help you select native plants to include in your garden, is a list of things to plant and things not to plant (extracted from “Welcoming Wildlife,” *allanimals*, May/June 2015):

### **1. Trees**

Plant this: Native trees such as red maples, sugar maples, oaks and serviceberries (*Amelanchier*)

Don't plant this: Bradford pears, which are not only short-lived trees with weak wood, but also have escaped into the wild landscape where they are out of control.

### **2. Shrubs**

Plant this: Fruiting natives such as blueberries, viburnums, dogwoods, beautyberries (*Callicarpa*), Spice bush (*Lindera benzoin*) and hollies

Don't plant this: Japanese barberry, nandina, pyracantha, burning bush and autumn olive, all of which are invasive and do not have nutritional value for wildlife. Japanese barberry is of particular concern because it provides habitat for deer tick populations, which are found in large numbers where barberry has escaped into the wild.

### **3. Grasses**

Plant this: Native grasses such as Little Bluestem and Pink Muhlygrass

Don't plant this: Ornamental, exotic grasses such as Chinese silvergrass (*Miscanthus sinensis*) and fountain grass. These exotic grasses have escaped from cultivation and are displacing native grasses in the landscape.

### **4. Perennials**

Plant this: Native plants such as milkweed (*Asclepias*), Joe-Pye weed, asters, *Rudbeckia* (Black-eyed susans and Purple coneflower), goldenrod; and ferns such as Christmas fern (which is evergreen) and Male fern.

Don't plant this: Choose the native species rather than named cultivars, which may have lost the traits that make them valuable for native wildlife.

Johnson's in Kensington has a section devoted to native plants, which I toured today and spotted Spice bush, Red-twig dogwood, Little Bluestem, and Purple coneflower, among others. Other area nurseries, such as Stadler's, Behnke's, and American Plant also sell native plants. You can make a difference by purchasing these plants and supporting their decision to stock natives.

- *and to build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and witnesses to the promise of God’s kingdom.”*



## **COMING UP IN THE FALL 2015...**



**JOY CIRCLE:** The group will begin a new *Horizons* Bible Study in September and has selected the 2015-2016 *Horizons* Bible Study, **“Come to the Waters”**, by Judy Record Fletcher. In this study, we will consider the waters of chaos in Genesis, and the River of Life in the last chapter of Revelation, where chaos is no more. Water plays a central role in the stories of creation, the delivery of God’s people (through the parting of the Red Sea and the crossing of the Jordan River), judgment of a people weak in faith, and the adoption of the people of God through baptism. Sometimes there is too much water (think Noah), and sometimes there is too little water (think drought in the desert).

Together, we will explore some of the Bible's 800 references to water. Study books are \$8 each. Please contact June Eakin, if you plan to buy a study book.

**BOOK GROUP:** The book group had another great year and closed it out in late June as we met on a dark and stormy night to discuss selections for next year. Though it was by no means intentional, we've discovered recurring themes in the books we've read this year... injustice, duty, rebellion and the psychological effects of being powerless. Possible selections for the coming season include, "The Boys in the Boat", "Same Kind of Different As Me", "Someone", "Purple Hibiscus", "Caleb's Crossing", and "The Shack". We are all anxiously awaiting the voting tally and final list. Our monthly discussions start in September. Lisa Smeallie spearheads this activity and we hope all women of Warner will join us.
