FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

There is an old Sufi story about an elderly woman who used to meditate on the bank of the Ganges River. One morning, finishing her meditation, she saw a scorpion floating helplessly in the strong current. As the scorpion was pulled closer, it got caught in roots that branched out far into the river. The scorpion struggled frantically to free itself but got more and more entangled. The woman immediately reached out to the drowning scorpion, but as soon as she touched it, she got stung by it. She withdrew her hand, but having regained her balance, she once again tried to save the creature. Every time she tried, the scorpion used its tail to sting her, so that her hands became bloody and her face was distorted with pain.

A passerby who saw the old woman reaching out to the scorpion shouted, “What’s wrong with you, woman! Why expose yourself to such pain to try to save that ugly thing?” The woman looked into the stranger's eyes and answered, “It is the nature of the scorpion to sting. Why should I deny my own nature, which is to reach out with compassion and care?”

There are times when we seek to show our care for others that we end up getting “stung.” They may reject our efforts. They may relapse into an addiction. It seems that the woman in the story might have used a stick instead of her hand to try to free the scorpion. But a loving compassion makes us a bit more vulnerable.

Did Jesus ever get “stung?” We are called to hold onto our own compassionate and caring identity even when we don't get all of the change we want.

We mustn't stop reaching out,

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

WHAT IS FAITH?

In the letter to Hebrews in the New Testament, faith is defined as **“the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.”**

Christian educator John Westerhoff III, in his book *Will Our Children Have Faith?* describes four stages of faith that provide an outline for our growth in the faith. According to Westerhoff faith grows like the rings of a tree, with each ring adding to and changing the tree somewhat, yet building on that which has grown before. He describes four rings of faith that are involved in the growth process:



- I. **EXPERIENCED FAITH** (pre-school & early childhood) — “This is what ‘we’ do. This is how ‘we’ act.” It is a time of imitation... a child prays the Lord’s Prayer without understanding the meaning of all the words.
- II. **AFFILIATIVE FAITH** (childhood & early adolescent years) — “This is what ‘we’ believe and do. This is ‘our’ group/church. It is a time of belonging to a group... still a time which centers around the imitation of what the group does.
- III. **SEARCHING FAITH** (late adolescence) — “Is this what ‘I’ believe?” This is a time of asking questions... not blindly accepting what others have said. This stage of faith is adding the ‘head’ to the ‘heart’ of the earlier states.
- IV. **OWNED FAITH** (early adulthood) — “This is what ‘I’ believe.” This stage only comes through the searching stage. This is the strong, personal faith that one witnesses to and one is willing to die for.

As part of the confirmation process, young people in our church spent time exploring answers to the question, “what is faith?” The 2016 Confirmation Class included Aliya Brammer, Ben Cope, Sophie deJesus, Matthew Koff, and Anne-Fleur Winter. Printed below are some of their statements of faith.

WARNER'S CONFIRMATION CLASS – STATEMENTS OF FAITH

I believe in the Holy Trinity; God three in one.

I believe in God; our father and caregiver.

I believe in Jesus his son, our teacher.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, God's helper, our desire to serve God.

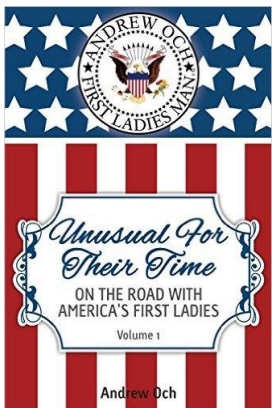

YOUR “MISSION COMMISSION” IN ACTION: THIS MONTH’S NEWS FROM YOUR COMMISSION TO THE COMMUNITY



In May we sent our annual contribution of \$1,500 to Hope Unlimited for Children. We at Warner are pleased to have been supporting Hope Unlimited in Brazil almost since its inception in 1991.

Here’s a review of what they do for street children in Brazil, taken from the website. In the **rescue** phase, the courts refer children who are at mortal risk to Hope, where the children are welcomed with immediate emotional support, psychological and medical care. In the **transformation** phase (four to eight years), the children are guided through educational programs and vocational coursework, while living in a supportive Christian family environment. In the **re-entry** phase, as the students approach graduation they intern with local businesses for a year and live in a transition home for six months. After graduation they continue to receive ongoing support.

Numbers: Hope operates two residential campuses housing 150 children; they also serve 450 preschool children, and have over 50 transitional and graduate homes. Most important, 85% of Hope graduates are in stable living conditions, meaningfully employed and active in a local church.

I wrote them recently and asked what effect the Zika virus has had on their work, and was told: “The Zika virus has had no impact on us at all. A bigger concern has been Dengue fever (we lost a staff member to it) and H1N1[swine flu], which has taken the lives of two individuals very close to the program.” So with our money we also send our prayers.

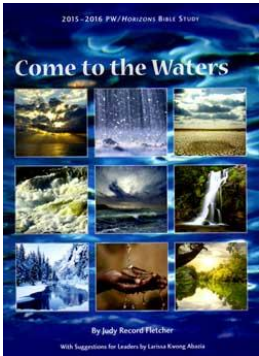
