## FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,



We now are a year and a half before the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. That major transition in the church has generally been viewed as starting when a monk named Martin Luther nailed 95 theses on a church door in what is now Wittenberg, Germany. It was a way to get a public discussion started and it led to vast changes in the church. There are those who think the church goes through a significant time of change every 500 years or so. Whether the changes that are currently happening within the church (broadly speaking) have to do with the period of time since the Reformation or not, we may not care. But certainly there are vast changes going on within our church and society. What is to be the church's role in this time and place?

To try to discern where God might be leading us, the Warner Session has decided to use an instrument that other congregations in our presbytery have found very useful. It is called the C.A.T. (Congregation Assessment Tool). This survey will measure your level of satisfaction and energy, and give you opportunity to share your thoughts and ideas. It will give the Session, with the help of trained interpreters from our presbytery, significant evidence-based information to help it as it seeks to discern important next steps for our congregation. But it will only be a helpful tool if we get a broad range of Warner members and friends to take the online survey.

We will be announcing soon when you can take the survey and you will be given a link to access it. For those who don't 'do computers,' efforts will be made to enable you to participate as well. It won't be one person nailing 95 ideas on the church door this time. I hope it will be a whole bunch of people sharing their thoughts and ideas to get a lot of informed discussion started as we seek to discern what God has in store for us.

## COMMUNITY

### **NEWS FROM WARNER'S COMMISSION TO THE COMMUNITY**

The Commission to the Community administers that part of Warner's annual budget which is given to make a difference in the world, both locally and around the world. In March, we sent \$350 each to Cornerstone Montgomery and to The Salvation Army. Here is a little information, gleaned from the Internet, about these organizations that we support on Warner's behalf:

Cornerstone Montgomery works to empower "people living with mental health and co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders to live, work and integrate successfully in the community."

At various places in Montgomery County they offer psychiatric rehabilitation, residential rehabilitation, assistance in finding and keeping jobs, and other relevant types of help.

The Salvation Army is well-known for providing various services to the needy. Every year we contribute to their Summer Camp Program, so that young people from the inner city can spend some time in a place for refreshment and learning. Children from the DC area go to "Camp Happyland" in rural Virginia, where they can sing, dance, and play under the supervision of the Salvation Army staff.

In addition, we have recently made use of the Centennial Fund to aid refugees from the war in Syria. The Centennial Fund was established for Warner's 100th birthday, to be invested and to provide funds from the accrued interest for needs as they arose. In March, we sent \$1,000 from this fund to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), for use in helping refugees from the Syrian war. PDA works with an alliance of other ecumenical partners who are providing relief to refugees in neighboring countries and to internally displaced Syrians. PDA has also been providing direct assistance to its mission partner, the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL), which is providing relief and care to many afflicted by the war.

Every garden needs gardeners and EST needs your help to make fresh organically - grown vegetables a reality for the hungry of Silver Spring. Isn't it amazing how God (through our hands) can turn a few dollars of seeds into many pounds of produce! June



Eakin and Susan Bresee are the lead gardeners and are willing to teach this rewarding activity. Can you offer even one hour a week? Some tasks are as simple as watering. Other tasks include weeding, planting, and harvesting. This work goes on April - October, with May being the peak need when establishing young plants. *Contact June (301- 3873-4794) if you will be "on call" as a garden helper. Young people can earn SSL hours.*

- bring kitchen plant waste from home to our garden compost bin
- plant trees on their property (obtained for free)
- buy renewable energy credits
- buy food through HungryHarvest.net

- send their plant waste to Compost Cab
- grow vegetables in their yard and shared gardens
- invest in socially responsible mutual funds
- use mass transit or walk instead of driving

## WHAT WE ARE “ABOUT” – INCLUDING THE BIRTHDAY OFFERING !

Do you think that Presbyterian Women are retired, knit baby blankets, roll bandages, prepare cookies to enjoy after worship, and wear sensible shoes? While some of this may be true for some of us, these attributes certainly do not reflect what we are truly all about. If you have read our annual report, attended our annual meetings, or read our monthly MEMO articles, you are likely familiar with our varied activities.

One of these activities is the **annual PW Birthday Offering** that started many years ago with women contributing a penny for every year of age to mission. Over the years, that tradition has become known as the Birthday Offering and Presbyterian Women have given more than \$29 million in support of mission projects throughout the world. **In the paper edition of this MEMO there is an envelope** that you may bring or mail to church to make a donation, regardless of your gender, that will go toward attaining the \$500,000 goal for the 2016 offering. Your donation provides grants across the country and internationally to -- serve boys and girls ages 11 to 17 who have been a part of the criminal justice system in Overland Park, Kansas; train individuals to build local justice ministries in Miami, FL; partner with more than 100 individuals and families to repair their manufactured homes in California through Habitat for Humanity; increase access to education for girls in the Republic of South Sudan, where the literacy rate is among the lowest in the world.

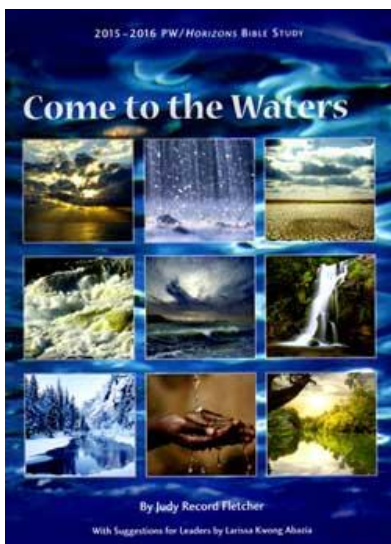

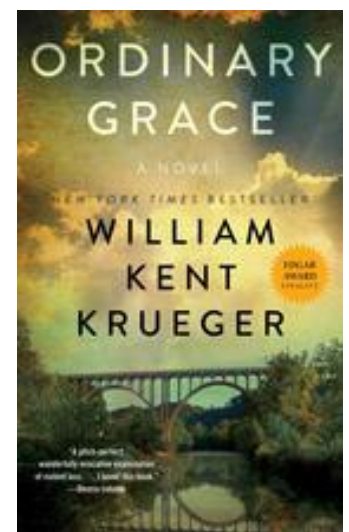

Told from Frank’s perspective 40 years after that fateful summer, *Ordinary Grace* is a brilliantly moving account of a boy standing at the door of his young manhood, trying to understand a world that seems to be falling apart around him. It is an unforgettable novel about discovering the terrible price of wisdom and the enduring grace of God.

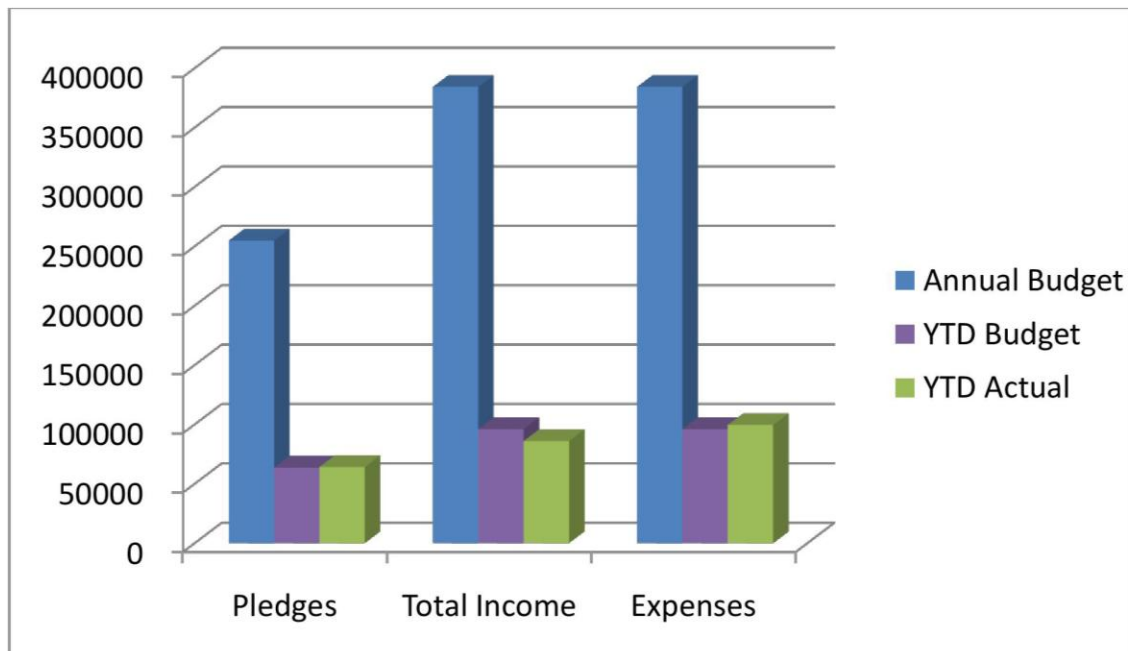
