I aim to bring prayer into all we do, ensure that this first leg of Warner's pastoral transition goes smoothly, and apply the gifts and skills God has given me to strengthen Warner for the next leg of the wonderful-but-also-challenging journey of following God's call. I welcome your prayers, thoughts, and trust as, together, we seek and follow the will of the One who gave us Winter—and Spring.

The Search for a New Pastor Begins...

Dear members and friends of Warner Memorial,



As we bid farewell to a beloved pastor and begin the journey of finding a new pastor to lead our congregation, I want to share with you the steps that the Session has taken to initiate the process. There are three stages to complete: arrange for a Short-term Supply pastor, select and contract with an Interim pastor, and call a new pastor.

We are fortunate to be able to contract with our former Parish Associate, Laura Hollister, to serve as the Short-term Supply Pastor while we conduct a search for an Interim Pastor. We are blessed to have Laura, who knows our congregation well and has led worship on numerous occasions and provided a pastoral care ministry during her time here as Parish Associate, a position that terminates with the departure of Rev. Kirby Lawrence Hill, the head pastor who invited her to serve in that capacity. Session felt that Laura will provide a sense of continuity to the congregation at a time of change, and an extra measure of comfort to those who need pastoral care. She can serve as a bridge to the Interim Pastor, who by contrast must be someone who has not been associated with the congregation and thus can help wean the church from its previous pastor and take us through the steps required to identify and welcome a new pastor.

At its April meeting, Session appointed an Interim Search Committee (ISC) comprised of Joel deJesus, a relatively new member of the church who serves on Session and is a member of the Administration and Finance Committee; Kay Gorman, Chair of the Worship and Music Commission and a member of the previous Pastor Nominating Committee that recommended calling Rev. Hill

as our pastor; MadalenaAspiras, a young adult who has grown up at Warner, loves the church, and wants to see it prosper; and me, a long-time member and Chair of the Personnel Committee. We have asked Jan Moody to serve as a consultant and liaison with the staff, since staff members are prohibited from being a part of the Search Committee, and yet their input is vital in identifying the qualities that are valued in a Head of Staff. The duties of the ISC are to set the compensation package for the Interim Pastor, draft an Interim Pastor position description, draft a Ministry Information Form if the search for an Interim Pastor will be made outside of the National Capital Presbytery (NCP), draft a position vacancy notice, receive and evaluate resumes, conduct interviews, and identify final candidates by listening to sermons, checking references, and hearing candidates preach. The ISC chooses a finalist and negotiates a contract, which is submitted to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry Administrator and Congregational Transitions Commission co-chairs for preliminary review and approval, and then to Session for approval. Once the contract receives final approval from Presbytery, the name of the candidate can be shared with the congregation.

The search process for an interim can take several months, especially since there are currently a large number of churches in the Presbytery that are seeking interim pastors. Most likely, it will involve a nation-wide search. We are confident that God knows the congregation's needs and has someone special in mind to lead Warner on the path to selecting a new pastor. After the Interim pastor arrives, the church can begin the process of evaluating what is needed in the next pastor, electing a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to go through the search process, and make a recommendation for Warner's next installed pastor.

Jan's new position will be full-time, so her last Sunday with us will be May 28th. We'll deeply miss Jan and the many ways she has touched our lives with God's word, grace, and love.

Yet, we look forward to honoring Jan's service among us. Jan will be with us on Saturday, June 3rd as Warner says goodbye to LCYC Director Karen Murphy. Separate plans are underway to give Jan a loving send-off during the fellowship hour on May 28th. More information will be forthcoming on Jan's send-off.

This is a lot of transition at one time. However, Warner is a resilient congregation with strong and able leaders. Moreover, do not doubt that God is with Warner—and will continue to be. As proof, we need only remember how Warner has been given what is needed at every crucial point in time.

2017 Mission Trip to Cumberland, MD

This summer, Warner Memorial
Presbyterian Church will be returning to
Cumberland, Maryland, between July 23rd and
July 28th for its mission trip. As in the past, we
will be participating in the NAILS program
which utilizes donations of supplies and funds,
as well as volunteer labor, to repair and

improve local homes so that owners can live comfortably and safely in their homes for as long as possible. The program specifically emphasizes assisting those with mobility impairments and health and safety concerns, as well as those in financial need.

NAILS utilizes local contractors and volunteers to complete home repairs, with volunteers coming from local organizations and visiting work groups from across the nation. Contributions to fund the NAILS projects come from the religious community, non-profit organizations, businesses and concerned citizens, as well as grants and donations from the County United Way, the Rotary Club of Cumberland, and participation fees from the volunteer work groups. This participation fee for Warner's mission trip is \$100 per volunteer, and will allow materials to be purchased before the arrival of our group.

In addition to the NAILS program, some of our volunteers will be spending part of their time performing special community service projects, such as packing lunches for needy children along with the members of the First Presbyterian Church (where we will be staying), or working with the Union Rescue Mission in their local emergency shelter.

Checks for the participation fee of \$100 should be made payable to Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church, and submitted by June 1, 2017, noting in the memo line that

Plans for Future Work for Haiti

After the death of Peter Graeff, who lived most of his life for Haiti, we have been thinking about how to continue the projects that he was involved in. We have money in the Commission to the

Community's annual budget that was intended for his work, and Warner has also received many gifts in his memory, which we

intend to use to continue and extend his work. Peter's primary focus was always to find ways to enable people to make better their lives and the lives of their families by acquiring knowledge, skills and tools. Three projects in particular will be our emphasis:



- * The local director of Service Chretien d'Haiti (Christian Service of Haiti) personally knows all the students whom Peter was supporting. We are trying to establish contact with him so that we can learn these students' needs and thus help them remain in school until they graduate.
- * The Agriculture Animators
 Organization was near and dear to
 Peter's heart for many years. In Haiti,
 an "animator" is someone who
 enlivens. This organization works to



"animate" agriculture, by giving farmers the tools and knowledge

they need to make a decent living, and to feed their families. We are eager to learn more about what we can do to support this work.

* The FetPov is an annual Feast for the Poor (in French it would be Fête des Pauvres). A woman named Fifi manages the Service Chretien d'Haiti guest house, where Peter was housed and cared for when he was bedridden. Every year, Fifi puts on a FetPov, where the poorest of the poor are fed, and given cooking pots and other useful gifts that they can use all year. We plan to continue supporting this act of charity.

NIH Easter Baskets



Working on a new Warner Cookbook

Work continues on the gathering of recipes for the next version of a Warner Cookbook. We are particularly keen to have recipes we have enjoyed at any of the various Warner social events, such as Potluck, Salt Shakers, Fellowship Hour, Lenten Suppers, etc. Please gather your favorite recipes, and submit them via email or hard copy, to Lisa Smeallie. We look forward to having an abundance of recipes to curate as we work on this endeavor. If you are interested in working on the Cookbook Crew, please let Lisa know. Definitive timelines are not yet set, but the next step will be assembling folk to get on the planning. This effort will certainly take a village.



Hilary Bragg and several of her friends have created a non-profit organization, "Write to Be," a registered 501c3 that provides mentorship, empowerment, and skills training for adolescent girls living at the Espwa Orphanage in Les Cayes,

Haiti. Living in the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, opportunity is bleak for the young girls with whom they work, many of whom are 4–5 years behind in school and have minimal opportunity to attend vocational school or university. Despite these challenges, **Write to Be** aims to equip these girls with skills that can empower them to become self-sufficient when it is time for them to live on their own.

A key to feeling empowered is having a strong encouraging support network. Girls participating in **Write to Be** are each paired with a young professional woman in the United States who correspond monthly via letters and teleconferencing on topics such as goal setting, role models, and self-identity.

To provide vocational training, **Write to Be** funds the **"Fi Ki Fò"** program, meaning **"strong girl"** in Creole. The program provides the girls throughout the school year with an additional 6-10 hours of classes a week to learn vocational skills from Haitian women in the community such as sewing, cooking, art, and English.

Donations are needed to help cover the cost of supplies, programming, and a small portion of travel expenses. Hillary and friends are hosting a Happy Hour, Friday, May 12th from 5:30-8pm at Hawthorne, which is located at 1336 U St NW, Washington, DC 20009. You can purchase a \$10 wristband at the door for extended happy hour prices and a chance to win great prizes in our raffle!

If Happy Hours are not your "thing," PW is collecting **supplies/donations that** the program coordinators on the ground have requested:

- glue (sticks/Elmer's)
- printing paper
- kids' clothes (especially underwear) is always needed
- soccer balls
- yoga mats
- dolls/African American Barbie dolls
- quality luggage (with wheels)
