Throughout October, Warner Church celebrates this season’s Special Offering. The Peacemaking Offering is now known as the Peace and Global Witness Offering, though Warner may continue to call it by its familiar name. At the PCUSA website, there is a page

YOUR SUPPORT FOR THE “2 CENTS-A-MEAL” PROGRAM MAKES IT WORK



For September and October, our discretionary portion (40%) of donations to the “2-Cents-a-Meal” program will assist **Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry**, an organization that helps low-income families in our area. On September 21 after worship, several of us met in the Warner Common Room for our monthly tabulation of the coins, currency and checks. We counted (and packaged for delivery) \$386.50 – mostly in coins! On Sunday, October 19, we’ll roll out the little red wagon again for your donations. If you can spare about 45 minutes that afternoon, please join us in counting the collection.

DONATING OLD SHOES BRINGS HOPE TO CHILDREN IN UGANDA

We are participating in a shoe collection project sponsored by Rukundo International. This non-profit organization was started by two women here in Montgomery County. Their goal is to bring Christian education to children in Kabale, Uganda. Many of these children are orphans due to the AIDS epidemic.

The project is simple and costs each of us nothing. In fact, it is an incentive to do something we probably need to do—clean out our closets. For every 2500 pairs of shoes that are collected, Rukundo International will receive \$1,000 from a partner organization.

In the U.S. alone, approximately 600 million pairs of shoes are thrown away each year. The materials used to manufacture shoes are created from chemical compounds, the kind that will create health hazards if left to disintegrate openly or in landfills. These shoes can instead be used in developing nations for impoverished people to start, maintain, and grow a micro-enterprise. Because of this opportunity, individuals are able to feed, clothe, and house their families. Collected shoes are cleaned, repaired, or melted down to make a new pair of shoes. The recipients of these shoes are eternally appreciative and become incredibly resourceful with the products they receive.

We have already donated 35 pairs to Rukundo and more are waiting to be delivered. Please look around your home and bring to the church any shoes, slippers, ski boots, flip flops or other foot gear. They can be in any condition. Please put them together in pairs and put them in the boxes in the Social Hall or outside the Christian Education office. Ask your friends to join us in collecting unwanted shoes. It is so simple to do!

WARNER-LCYC WORK DAY SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 25

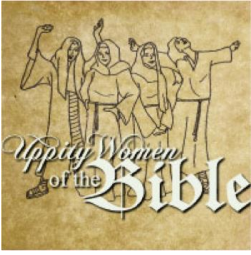

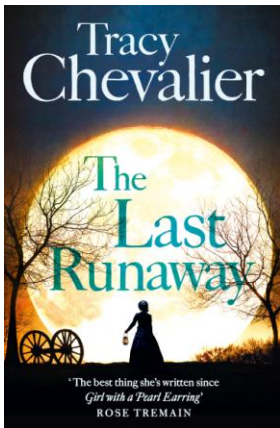


JOY CIRCLE MEETS TUESDAY, OCTOBER 14

2014 THANK OFFERING COLLECTION STARTS NOVEMBER 2!

History of the PW Thank Offering

The Thank Offering is a PW offering collected in the fall of each year that gives women a tangible way to express their gratitude for the special blessings in their lives. The offering funds projects such as agricultural development, child care, community organization, criminal justice, drug counseling, economic justice, elderly care, employment



training, homelessness, literacy, violence and women's concerns. At least 40% of this offering supports health ministries throughout the world, while the remaining 60% funds new creative ideas for mission. The goal for the 2013 Thank Offering was \$900,000. Thanks to your generous giving to the 2013 Thank Offering, 30 projects (17 national and 13 international) will receive grants,

allowing them to improve the lives of women, children and men in need. The recipients will provide an array of services in their communities—a reading program for children in Phoenix, clean water in India, transportation for refugee families in Nashville, and a pig farming program that will provide income for women in Congo, and much more. The grants awarded total \$699,125. At least 40 percent of the offering funds health ministries.

Warner PW plan to begin collecting for the **2014 Thank Offering on November 2nd** at that day's Fellowship Hour, where we will be have offering envelopes available. We plan to collect your contributions throughout the month of November. Thank you in advance for your participation this year.
