FROM THE PASTOR

Dear members and friends,

“How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying,” is a great musical that has been around for several decades. How to succeed in matters of church business does not come without really trying. I am quite thankful that Warner has many very competent and dedicated volunteers that try real hard to make sure our business aspects of church life succeed. Let me give a few updates about several Warner business projects.

We expect the sale of the grassy lot at 3905 Prospect Street to go through toward the end of September. The proceeds we receive from this sale will help us pay down our construction loan that enabled the building of the elevator tower and several other renovation projects. It will also help us pay for a new curb cut for overflow parking for the remaining part of our grassy lot. We count on Warner members and friends to complete their capital fund pledge giving by the end of 2015, which is anticipated to enable us to pay off our loan by the end of this year (saving twelve years of interest payments).

The refurbishment work done following the flood the church building suffered in the spring is complete except for the installation of the wood flooring for the chancel in the sanctuary. We expect the materials for the installation to arrive soon and look forward to that completed work. The vast majority of the work was covered by our good insurance coverage.

Warner’s Session has established a team called the Bequests and Undesignated Giving (B.U.G.) Team to examine the financial resources we have in special gifts to formulate a recommendation to the Session about how those funds would be used for a variety of purposes. Our regular church budget cannot address all of the needs of our physical plant or of creative initiatives that are needed. We became aware recently that the in-floor heating system on our ground floor (that was part of the original construction of this facility 60 years ago) is no longer functional. So the Session has taken the first step to address that concern, authorizing about \$15,000 to get started on meeting this need. More funds will be needed, which will diminish the funds that B.U.G. is counting on for their planning recommendation. I will keep you updated on those ‘cold’ hard facts.

There are no real shortcuts in how to succeed in matters of church business without really trying. What we do have are dedicated volunteers that have been working very hard, and we are seeing the benefits of all of that giving of time, effort and money that are required for the success of Warner’s overall ministry.

There are many who deserve a standing ovation!

WARNER'S FALL CHURCH SCHOOL SCHEDULE STARTS WITH RALLY DAY

On September 13, Sunday Morning Church School Classes and Choirs for All Ages begin our Fall Schedule:

SOMETHING OLD, SOMETHING NEW

Adult and Youth Church School classes will continue using “Feasting on the Word” Curriculum. The Scripture Lesson for the morning is Mark: 7:24-37. The adult session focuses on human tendencies to erect barriers and how Jesus lifts a model of mercy that breaks down walls that separate us from one another. The youth will explore the good news extended to outsiders and find inspiration for reaching across boundaries. The Children's Class will use the new “Growing in Grace and Gratitude” curriculum. They will celebrate the grace in God's good creation and explore what it means to be created in God's image: Genesis 1:27.

FALL MOVIE NIGHT

As a follow-up to the “Teaching Tolerance” Sunday School series offered last June, the Christian Education Commission will host a showing of the movie “Selma” on Sunday evening, **September 13 at 7:00 p.m.** in the Common Room. The movie chronicles Martin Luther King's campaign to secure equal voting rights via a march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama in 1965. Child care is available upon request.

UPCOMING YOUTH ACTIVITY

Youth, in grades 6 through 12 are invited to a “Faith in Action” activity. On the morning of **Wednesday, September 23**, we will be going down to D.C. Central Kitchen to help prepare meals. We will meet at the Forest Glen Metro at 8:00 a.m., and return to Forest Glen Metro around 1:00 p.m.. Come join the team that provides 5,000 free meals each day to nearby homeless shelters, transitional homes, and schools.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE

LOOKING TOWARD NEW DIRECTION

The Library Committee has recently begun meeting again, and the members (Jan Moody, chair; Susan Fulton, Marie Rosché, Janet Tennent, Donna McNeil & JoEllen LaPrade) have been pondering what direction to take, to make the library useful for the Warner community.

An article from the Library Committee should probably showcase some books: Because former President Jimmy Carter has been in the news recently with his health concerns, I chose two books written by him that are in the library: [Our Endangered Values: America's Moral Crisis](#) (2005) and [Palestine: Peace Not Apartheid](#) (2006). Here are portions of the summaries of these books, from Amazon.com:

“In [Our Endangered Values](#), Jimmy Carter describes personally his own involvement and reactions to some disturbing societal trends that have taken place during the past few years. These changes involve both the religious and the political worlds as they have increasingly become intertwined, and include some of the most crucial and controversial issues of the day - frequently encapsulated under 'moral values'.”

From the Amazon review of [Palestine: Peace, Not Apartheid](#):

“... [T]he former president, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, offers an assessment of what must be done to bring permanent peace to Israel with dignity and justice to Palestine.

“President Carter, who was able to negotiate peace between Israel and Egypt, has remained deeply involved in Middle East affairs since leaving the White House...”

Now, I'd like to set the spotlight on a book that is not only brand new in our library, but is about to be released as a movie: [The Martian](#), by Andy Weir. We will all have the opportunity to talk about it together in this year's first **Book Talk** session, which will take place in the library after worship on **Sunday, October 11th**.

(From Amazon) “Six days ago, astronaut Mark Watney became one of the first people to walk on Mars. Now, he's sure he'll be the first person to die there. After a dust storm nearly kills him and forces his crew to evacuate while thinking him dead, Mark finds himself stranded and completely alone with no way to even signal Earth that he's alive—and even if he could get word out, his supplies would be gone long before a rescue could arrive. Chances are, though, he won't have time to starve to death. The damaged machinery, unforgiving environment, or plain-old "human error" are much more likely to kill him first.

“But Mark isn't ready to give up yet. Drawing on his ingenuity, his engineering skills—and a relentless, dogged refusal to quit—he steadfastly confronts one seemingly insurmountable obstacle after the next. Will his resourcefulness be enough to overcome the impossible odds against him?”

Does this sound like science fiction? It is. Does it seem like an odd choice for a church library? Maybe, but there's more than dry science here... do you remember the movie *Apollo 13*?

I think the teaser trailer for *The Martian* says it best: “Every human being has a basic instinct; to help each other out.” This is science made very accessible, a vision of the future that could be “just around the corner for us,” according to NASA Director Jim Green. And it's fiction that we hope in our hearts could be true.

There are two copies of [The Martian](#) available in the library. It's a quick read (385 pages) because you will WANT TO KNOW what happens! The movie premieres on October 2nd. If you want to discuss this book, or the movie, or if you are simply curious about what the library committee is up to, please join us in the library after worship on October 11th.

QUESTIONS

1. My name is not included as a Team Lead or a team member? Why not? How were the groups established?

We created the groups by considering those who attend regularly and were likely to participate in any way. If we missed you, and you are interested in being assigned to a group, please contact any member of the Outreach Commission and we would be thrilled to add you- there is no maximum number per group.

2. If I am a Group Lead and cannot serve on a Sunday assigned for my Group – how will coverage be arranged?

You will notice that there are two group leads and only one will be expected to oversee each Sunday. The first approach will be to check with your group lead partner and determine if he or she can fill in and you could then swap. If that is not possible, contact Sue Burns and she will reach out to other group leads to arrange a swap.

3. Is each Group expected to provide a “lunch” each Sunday?

The plan for food is left to the group lead and the group members. No group is expected to provide a full meal on any given Sunday. Providing a “Simple Sunday” selection of foods is always an option. Hot coffee, hot water for tea, something cold to drink along with cookies, fruit and or veggies would be an appropriate array of offerings.

4. Can I plan a Simple Sunday anytime, or just the third Sunday of the month?

Absolutely – any Sunday is fine.

5. Will I be expected, as a Group Lead, to purchase paper goods, coffee, flowers, etc.?

No, members of the Outreach Commission have done a stellar job of keeping plates, napkins, hot and cold cups, utensils, etc. in stock. There is a supply in the cabinets (located below where we typically

serve the coffee) next to the warming drawers in the social hall and an overflow stock in the closet next to the water fountain in the social hall.

6. Will I be expected to cook a dish each time my Group is scheduled?

Not necessarily, each person will contribute as able, and as inspired. There are lots of ways to help as we indicated in the letter sent out recently.

7. Will I be reimbursed for items I purchase or prepare for a Fellowship Hour?

Please confer with your group lead for guidance regarding this. Outreach allocates a certain amount of its budget for Fellowship and a modest amount is available to reimburse folks for items purchased. Again, please check with your group lead so you have a correct understanding before you purchase items.

8. Will I be expected to set up and break down tables and chairs?

Not always and NEVER if you are not able. There are those of us who enjoy the “Warner Sunday Workout”, but clearly many are not able or interested in this activity. In general, we have made arrangements for food tables and 3 tables w/ 8 chairs each to be left up late Saturday evening to facilitate set-up on Sunday AM. The break-down following Fellowship Hour has occurred thanks to volunteers each Sunday and we expect that to continue.

9. Why can't we just keep things the way they are; that process seems to be working just fine?

There are a multitude of reasons for trying this new approach:

- **Change alone is accompanied by a new energy – let's make it a positive energy**
- **Let's get more Warnerites involved in new ways**
- **Many hands make light labor**
- **Working together leads to new and enhanced friendships**
- **Etc...**

10. Can I help another Group even if I am not assigned that week?

Sure – I can't imagine a scenario where help would be turned down. Just contact the assigned group lead for the week.

11. I don't have email, how will I be notified or hear about “My Sunday”?

Group Leads will have the contact information for each of the members of his/her groups and will be aware of the best way to contact folks. By the way, contacting group members is one of the ways folks can help if not otherwise able to contribute.

12. Why can't we just have coffee and cookies each Sunday... that would be so much simpler?

Guess what??? We can... and we may – let's see how things progress and have faith in our ability to try out something new.



JOY CIRCLE BEGINS NEW “HORIZONS” BIBLE STUDY




On Tuesday, September 8th, this group will begin its new Horizons Bible Study in September, **“Come to the Waters”** by Judy Record Fletcher. In this study, we will consider the waters of chaos in Genesis, and the River of Life in the last chapter of Revelation, where chaos is no more. Water plays a central role in the stories of creation, the delivery of God’s people (through the parting of the Red Sea and the crossing of the Jordan River), judgment of a people weak in faith, and the adoption of the people of God through baptism. Sometimes there is too much water (think Noah) and sometimes there is too little water (think drought in the desert). Together, we will explore some of the Bible’s 800 references to water. Study books are \$8 each. Please contact June Eakin, if you have not already done so and plan to buy a study book.

EQUAL EXCHANGE/FAIR TRADE COFFEE




REFLECTIONS CIRCLE BEING REVIVED
