PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Warnerites,

On Sunday, November 24, we concluded our series on the story of the Exodus with the commencement speech of Joshua. Imploring the Israelites to consider the god they will serve, we, as individuals and as a congregation, are challenged to consider whom we will serve too. As we look toward our future, we could choose to devote ourselves to the god of success, the god of productivity, the god of self-determination, the god of 'growing the church'–surely these gods are popular among society. OR, we can choose the God of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love–the God of Life.

Joshua claims, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15) and as the Warner Memorial Church, so do we. We will serve the God who provides for our need, the God who lovingly offers a path to goodness when we're wandering aimlessly, the God who forgives and reconciles, the God who lifts up the lowly and comforts the mourning, the God who liberates from all that oppresses, the God in whose image we are made, the God who loves us and blesses us and keeps us and will not let us go, the God who created and creates and is creating in and among us at all times, the God who mends the brokenness, the God who breaks the bonds of death—the God of Life.

The question we must reflect on next, however—is "How?" How will we live such that our devotion to God is made known? How might others in our community know that we choose to serve the God of Life, the God of all gods, the God of all creation? And, will they know that they can join us in choosing life over brokenness and death?

Advent is a season of endings and beginnings. As the calendar year comes to a close, a new church year begins. Christ's birth ushers us into new ways of living and loving; and yet, the world as we know it

spins on and on. In our spinning world, let us take time this season to ponder the ways the God of Life dwells in and among us. Let us take time to give thanks, to feel hope, to experience peace, to delight in joy and to revel in love. Let us take time to notice the light shining in the darkness. And, as we invite others to notice the light with us, may the light of Christ shine evermore brightly, evermore boldly, evermore brilliantly.

ANNOUNCEMENTS Update on the AC Process

On Monday, November 18, our slate of ruling elders were trained via Zoom by Rev. David Baer, the Stated Clerk of the National Capital Presbytery. The slate of elders will meet with the Administrative Commission on Sunday, December 8 @ 2:30pm to be formally examined (as is custom). Then, at 3pm, the congregation will vote to approve their election.

On Tuesday, November 19, the National Capital Presbytery approved the motion that "the Administrative Commission for Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church be DISMISSED with thanks, upon its anticipated action to return original jurisdiction to the session of the church on December 8, 2024."

Special Music Sunday - December 15th - 2 Events!

Our special music service is at 11am and features the Sanctuary and Bell Choirs. "Kneeling in Bethlehem" is a suite of carols for chorus and congregation featuring the poetry of Ann Weems. Then at 1:00pm, after the service and fellowship hour, you can enjoy a visit with our beloved long-time music director John Horman, who will present "Sing Your Way To Christmas", an interactive journey through his books of Christmas Carols and the stories surrounding them. Here's what John has to say about the day:

Sing Your Way to Christmas

For over 50 years I have been a strong advocate for group singing as a way for people to enjoy music together and appreciate both our common humanity and colorful diversity. As our country has diversified, it has been increasingly difficult to find songs which everyone knows. In today's world "community song" is most easily found in the songs sung to celebrate the Christmas holiday season. Whether sacred Christmas carols or simple holiday songs about Santa and snowmen, these songs are a source of delight and religious celebration. I also have become aware over the years that if we know something about the "when", "who" and "why" a song was created, we sing it with more intensity and deeper understanding. For example: Knowing that the lyrics to "Winter Wonderland" were written by a young man suffering from Tuberculosis, confined inside for most his life and unable to enjoy the outdoor beauty and fun of the winter season, makes the lyrics come alive with new poignancy.

During the pandemic, when I was, like everyone else, stuck inside my house, I decided to research the origins of sacred and secular holiday songs. This resulted in two books: Sing Your Way to Christmas, Vol. I and Sing Your Way to Christmas, Vol. II. Combined, these two books contain over 50 familiar and unfamiliar Christmas songs and carols. Included are background stories for each song and carol as well as the

music when possible. The presentation will be a 1 hour program of songs and carols included in the book, with a handout which includes materials from both volumes. I will also have copies of both books available if people wish to purchase them or they may buy them on Amazon.

We hope to see you in church for "Kneeling In Bethlehem" and "Sing Your Way To Christmas!"

COMMISSION TO THE COMMUNITY

Christmas Joy Special Offering

Honoring and Celebrating Church Leaders: Past, Present and Future

This Advent Season, Warner will participate in our denomination's Christmas Joy Offering. By helping us support church leaders who have and continue to point us to God, the Christmas Joy Offering celebrates God's perfect gift to us. The offering honors retired pastors, church workers and their families, as well as emerging leaders who are pursuing their education at Presbyterian-supported schools and universities.

The Board of Pensions will receive and distribute fifty percent of the offering received. In 2023, income supplements helped nearly 275 retired church workers and surviving spouses provide for themselves. Housing supplements helped more than 218 recipients remain in their homes, afford assisted living, or receive long-term care. Emergency Assistance Grants helped more than 215 recipients facing great financial need or uncertainty due to unforeseen circumstances. The support the Christmas Joy Offering provides is vital to church workers who are facing financial challenges.

The remaining fifty percent will be used to enhance education and leadership development skills at three Presbyterian-related educational institutions: the Menual School in Albequerque, NM, the Presbyterian Pan American School in Kingsville, TX, and Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, AL. All of these institutions are equipping communities of color, and many of the students at these institutions are the first in their families to enroll in higher education.

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; On those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. Isaiah 9:2

Dear friends.

Not long ago a famous Peruvian priest and theologian, Gustavo Gutierrez, passed away after 98 years of life. He was known in ecumenical circles as a prophet of the poor who led with humility, curiosity, courage and grace. Among his many oft cited words are the following:

To hope does not mean to know the future, but rather to be open, in an attitude of spiritual childhood, to accepting it as a gift.

He, like so many of the Peruvian people we are privileged to walk with, have known deep pain, suffering and struggle in their lives. They know the uncertainty of each day, each moment. They know that nothing is guaranteed. And yet...

They walk with arms wide open, in anticipation of the gift of life that awaits them – not because they know what is up ahead but because they know that the gift of life is worth waiting for.



Such life is known in the encounters with those we love and those eager to share such love. As we reflect on this past year, despite the challenges, the struggles, the defeats, the uncertainties, the fears, we have also known such life through such encounter with our partners, with one another, and with you!


PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

FINANCIAL UPDATE

The Administration and Finance Commission has worked with the other commissions to prepare a draft budget for 2025. It has been forwarded to the Administrative Commission for approval so that the new Warner Session will have this spending plan in hand as they begin work in 2025.

Someone recently asked if they can still donate to Warner using a check. Of course you can! To make a gift to Warner, you can send a check to the church made out to WMPC, donate online at https://warnermemorial.org/giving/, use the QR code, or Text-to-Give at 301-822-2580. We can even take other forms of giving such as negotiable stocks or you can use a donor advised fund.



Below is a high-level view of the church's operating income and expenses compared to the budget, as of October 31, 2024.

In November, \$60,000 was transferred to LCYC to cover borrowing through October.

Working with the Commission Chairs and Pastor JC, the Administration and Finance Commission prepared a proposed budget for 2025 (see next page). This was approved by the Administrative Commission in November and will help the newly constituted Session in 2025. Please note that we continue to spend more than our receipts. As a result, we anticipate selling up to \$112,000 of our investments to cover costs in 2025.
